Requirements of Volunteers

- ◆ Completed and approved application
- High School graduates and older for One-Month (July) Volunteers
- College graduates and older for Yearlong Volunteers
- Good physical and mental health
- ♦ Flexibility
- Maturity
- At least 2 years of college and/or work experience for year-long volunteers
- Provides own transportation to and from Haiti
- Valid passport, visa if needed
- Up-to-date vaccinations and any other health care needs are the responsibility of the volunteer
- Ability to learn Haitian Creole (for yearlong volunteers

QUEST-Volunteers for Haiti

Choose between two service opportunities:

One-Month Volunteer

Be a Summer Camp Counselor at Kan Klodin (Creole for "Camp Claudine") which runs for four weeks from the last week of June until the end of July.

The Camp is sponsored by RJMs and administered by a team of Haitian educators, local teenagers, and Quest Volunteers.





About 300 elementary school children attend the Camp each summer,

participating in arts and crafts, sports, eat-

ing two meals a day, and swimming in the nearby river.







The children thrive in the safety of Kan Klodin, where they get to be simply children, unconcerned about their next meal.

Year-long Volunteer

Be a year-long volunteer from August to August, changing lives by working in a wide range of ministry areas including:

Education

Tutor Spanish, English, math, science, reading, information technology, or art, to youth in pre-school, elementary, or high school.



Agriculture

Work with local agronomists on reforestation and other erosion control efforts, experiment

with various planting and gardening technologies to help farmers improve their yields and practices, raise



seedlings in a tree nursery, and promote the financial and nutritional benefits of vegetable gardening.

<u>Technology</u>



Collaborate with teachers and students to integrate technology into daily classroom learning, how to use software, social media and do internet-based re-

search; train youth to maintain hardware; and work alongside of Haitian technicians showing computer and solar energy maintenance.

Construction

Depending on need and financing, construct homes, classrooms, playgrounds and latrines (both hygienic and composting) under the guidance of Haitian contractors.



Economic Development

Coordinate a microfinance program for high-risk women looking to expand their small business ventures; partner with local artisans to improve and market their crafts; work with local entrepreneurs to start their business.



Haiti has many needs. RJMs, Quest Volunteers, and Haitians all work together to meet these needs, with programs designed to improve lives and transform the future of the Haitian people.
