#### PROTECTING CHILDREN / ENDING PRACTICE OF RESTAVIKS

Sr. Laura Dulude, all of you reading this, and our sisters who have gone on before us, who were moved by the plight of Haitian children in domestic service/slavery (Restaviks), were here in spirit Sunday, March 26.

More than 600 participants took part in this Open Space activity after eight weeks of dialogue groups about how to protect children. Each of the thirty groups (with 12 to19 participants) used illustrated books with real stories of the plight of children in restavek situations. People shared strategies about raising their own children and the children of deceased relatives living with them.

Sunday all the participants had a chance to form different sharing groups among themselves so that they could develop a 4-neighborhood plan for ending violence against children and women and girls. As I was leaving, one lovely young woman asked, "Do we really have to stop after six months, this is so good of us!"





The Child Protection Program is funded by a grant from the Conrad H. Hilton Foundation to the Catholic Sisters Haiti Collaborative. The School Sisters of Notre Dame and their partner, Mercy Beyond Borders, are extending their program to four Gros Morne neighborhoods where leaders shared with the Religious of Jesus and Mary their interest in this program to change community attitudes.

# WORKING WITH NIÑOS IN SPAIN

From February 19th until March 23rd I had the privilege of having the apostolic experience of the novitiate in Piños Puente, a small town outside of Granada in southern Spain. For 50 years, the sisters have run an escuela infantil (which is for infants through kindergarten) serving just over 100 pupils. I spent my days from 9:30 in the morning until 4:30 in the afternoon helping out in various classrooms, including trying my hand at teaching numbers, colors, and body parts in English. I'm not sure how much they learned but we had fun dancing, singing, and jumping all around. And of course they were all fascinated by the new person with the strange accent.




What is unique about this population, and why the bishop 50 years ago requested the sisters start a school, is that the population mostly consists of persons with gypsy ethnicity. The population is poor in many ways including a significant number who are illiterate. When the community first established themselves on the hillside above the town their homes were initially dug out as caves into the hillside. Now all the homes have grown into more "house" structures including having electricity and indoor plumbing (even though the majority tap into the electrical and plumbing lines illegally so they do not have to pay). Some of the homes even have in-ground pools and glass porches. Over time the community has transitioned from mostly subsisting on robbing transportation trucks to now many of them making their living through production and distribution of marijuana (which remains illegal here and why so many tap into the electrical and water systems as it takes a lot of energy and water to grow the marijuana) and arms trafficking. This has significantly increased the income for some of the population and many children in the neighborhood have iPhones and electric scooters. Yet, there remains a lack of prioritizing education and home environments remain unstable creating environments where the children after leaving our school do not thrive in the public school system. Therefore there remains a high illiteracy rate in the area and a vicious cycle of poverty.

The sisters for decades have wanted to extend the school into a primary school, but given that the school in the town isn't full (mostly due to poor education in the public school that those with means send their children to other schools) the government will not give approval and economic support to expand our little school on the hill.

Despite the challenges of educating in a more violent neighborhood, the sisters, who live in a home attached to the school, and the entire extraordinary staff team are a shining example for the students and families at the school, with their energy and love for the children and excitement to see the children learn and grow. The experience was a month full of life, love, learning, and many, many hugs from the little ones. ### NEW PARTNER IN MISSION: Director of Mission Advancement

Mr. Tobias (Toby) Harkleroad has accepted an offer to assume the position of Director of Mission Advancement for the USA/Haiti Province. He is scheduled to begin on April 3<sup>rd</sup>.



Toby's appointment concludes a process that began in the Province Assembly's *Statement of Commitment*, in which members pledged to "strengthen our volunteer program," and "direct more financial resources to mission." When the present Leadership Team took office, work was already well underway with consultants to formulate a development plan and a job description for a director. As this continued, it became clear that the two roles of Director of Development and Director of Companions in Mission might well be combined into this new role of Mission Advancement. The DC Leadership Team found in Toby the combination of passion for mission, experience and competence that made him the ideal choice.

Our new director's background includes time as the Director of Campaigns for the Franciscan Action Network and eleven years as the Founding Principal of St. Francis International School in Silver Spring, MD. He has received awards for his work including one for *Leadership in Promoting Diversity in Catholic Education*. Among his presentations is a lecture given as part of a "Laudato Si Revolution Course" sponsored by the Order of Friars Minor: *A Path Towards a Comprehensive Ecological Education and Spirituality for Social Transformation*. Toby is currently pursuing a doctorate in ministry development at the Virginia Theological Seminary.


