Recently, the Washington State Senate passed House Bill 1085 to reduce plastic pollution. The bill, sponsored by Representative Sharlett Mena (D-Tacoma), requires that new buildings constructed with water fountains also contain bottle filling stations; phases out the use of small plastic containers, wrappers and packaging for personal care items like shampoo or soap by hotels and other lodging establishments; bans soft film-wrapped floats and docks; and mandates a study of hard-shell foam-filled floats and docks.

The bill previously passed the House and now heads to Governor Inslee to be signed into law.

"Plastic pollution and microplastics are harming our environment, our marine wildlife, and bodies. Since 1983, we've generated 85 billion metric tons of plastic waste and for



further context that would be equal to the weight of 25,000 Empire State Buildings. We can do better," said Rep. Mena. "This bill helps us chip away at plastic pollution in three simple ways, reducing unnecessary packaging in hotels and motels, cutting down on plastic water bottles by making more places to fill reusable water bottles, and by banning polystyrene foam from being used for docks unless it is adequately covered. This will help prevent those little microplastics from getting into the water and cut down on unnecessary plastic waste."

Said Giovanni Severino, Lead Policy Organizer, Latino Community Fund of Washington, "This action in Washington is helping set a standard for states across the country looking to put the planet over plastic and leave a cleaner, healthier environment for our future generations."

CONFERENCE SERIES - Laudato Si' and the US Catholic Church

The 2023 *Laudato Si'* and the U.S. Catholic Church national conference will be held in June and July! <u>Free registration is now live</u>.

The biennial conference series is co-sponsored by Creighton University and Catholic Climate Covenant to equip and inspire Catholics to more deeply integrate *Laudato Si'* and its creation care teachings into the U.S. Church.

This summer's Catholic ecological convening, will be held virtually over a series of evenings starting on June 14th and concluding July 27th.

The purpose of this year's conference will be to encourage a greater understanding of the Laudato Si' Action Platform's seven goals and encourage Catholic individuals and groups to enroll in the Platform, providing them with a clearer path for accomplishing each of the goals through speaker presentation.

Each virtual 90-minute session will be on the goals of the Vatican's <u>Laudato Si'Action Platform</u> and feature a scholar who describes the goal, U.S. faith-driven practitioners who outline their work to achieve the goal, and a moderated Q&A.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROJECT - Cotton, Haiti (near Jean Rabel)

"Our Common Home " is in terrible danger! Pope Francis has written about it in his Letter " Laudato Si". Our Jesus and Mary Sisters have included it in their list of priorities. " We commit to care for OUR COMMON HOME" in the commitment statement of USA-Haiti Province.

Our local Bishop, Mgr. Barthelus, has created a group, "GAPENO" (Group d'Actions pour la Protection de L'Environnement du Nord-Ouest) to try and create a cleaner environment.



In the JM mission in Jean Rabel, a young agronomist, Olby Desir, was employed last September to work in the 3 school gardens of Acadien, Gros Sable and Cotton. He also gave educational and practical experience to the pupils and teachers. After visiting the schools, consulting with the principals, a plan was drawn up. Garden tops were bought and delivered, water canals were unblocked or built, ground was prepared and seeds planted. Travel to two of the schools was a problem during the fuel crisis, but Olby like most of the teachers walked to the schools. Full evidence of this was seen in the wear and literally tear on the shoes and socks!

Tomatoes, sweet and hot peppers, aubergines, onions, carrots, sweet potatoes, etc., were planted. Some immediate results were seen. The ripe tomatoes were eaten immediately,

as there is still lack of food in the family homes due to the huge hike in prices and drought that set in after the first, and if one was fortunate enough to have seeds, the second planting.

However education classes were taking place, with both teachers and pupils. All were learning to respect the environment. An experiment was carried out, burying plastic and organic waste. Some months later it was unearthed to discover that the plastic waste remained the same, while the organic was degraded.

A fantastic environmental celebration took place in Cotton! 110 pupils, 12 staff members, the local Casek leader, and other visitors attended the event.





There was a display of local produce, Chaka... a nutritious stew of various vegetables, spices and meat....cakes made using local corn and other types of flour, popcorn, and delicious Tamarin juice! There was a healthy meal of "diri djondjon" and vegetables.

Olby spoke about the importance of caring for the environment, eliciting information from the pupils, and complimenting them on their involvement. Creole music was played, some of the pupils danced, a tasting competition took place, and there was a fabulous atmosphere of enjoyment.



Then the pupils went to the garden to plant some trees. They then took a tree plant each and promised to plant it in their own house garden and look after it.

A very worthwhile day was spent by all!

Our new Bishop, Richard Henning, Presided at the **Jubilee Mass for Women and Men Religious in the diocese of Providence**. It was held in St. Kevin Church, a mere ten-minute drive from St. Timothy Convent. A lovely, spacious, bright and beautiful place of worship it is.

The ceremony was followed by a beautifully laid out dinner and some photo-taking with the Bishop. As luck would have it, the RJM contingent was seated at a table near the end of the serving line. As Bishop Henning finished serving himself, he looked around for a seating possibility . . . and there we were waving him over to join us in the one empty chair at our table.



Bishop Henning gladly joined our conversation asking about our Congregation, our parish, and easily answered our questions about his upbringing on Long Island. He certainly was aware of the name of St. John's parish in Kingsbridge, Bronx which he knowingly referred to as "Da Bronx". So, of course, we gave him a quick overview of "Social Coin" in Woonsocket as well as of the beautiful former St. Anne's-church-now-Museum. He asked for prayers concerning the most difficult and pressing problem he has facing him right now, namely, what to do about so many dying parishes and so few priests in the diocese. He is quite concerned about his younger priests who are experiencing great weariness in their ministry. Already since his January arrival in RI, he has driven himself to visit about forty plus parishes in the diocese. No muss, no fuss, but he is "hitting the ground running" and definitely getting a flavor of the attitudes percolating in different quarters of the state.

It was an unexpected religious highlight for the St. Timothy parishioners to witness three Religious of Jesus and Mary renew their vows during the nine a.m. Sunday Mass on April 23. The Jubilarians who were able to be present celebrated 70 years

(Sister Alice Ouimette), and 65 years of vowed life (Sisters Pauline Ayotte and Doris Bissonnette). Those who could not be physically present prayed their renewal deep in their hearts at home – Sisters Vivian Patenaude (65 years), Michelle Authier, Alice Coté, and Claudette Lapointe (60 years). 
