

TAKE ACTION - Help Stop the Violence in Haiti

Below is an excerpt from a recent Sisters of Mercy email

I join in the heartfelt appeal of the country's Bishops to "lay down weapons, choose life, choose to live together fraternally in the interest of all and in the interest of Haiti". I am close to the beloved Haitian people; I hope that the spiral of violence will cease and the nation can resume the journey toward a future of peace and harmony. - Pope Francis, Post-Angelus Commentary, 11 July 2021



The challenges in Haiti are numerous. Haiti has been consumed in violence, with armed gangs controlling large parts of the country. A major source of weapons is the U.S., both through illegal channels, and even weapons that supposedly are destined for the police force end up in the hands of gangs. The current government of Ariel Henri is viewed as illegitimate and there are calls for the U.S. to withdraw support for him and instead to urge dialogue and negotiations to bring all segments of society to the table to plan free and fair elections.

In terms of advocacy responses, the Mercy Justice Team is collaborating with the Quixote Center.

Representative Joaquin Castro introduced the Caribbean Strategic Engagement Act to "reduce the flow of illicit firearms to the Caribbean region". Castro's office is seeking co-sponsors in the House of Representatives. The Quixote Center posted a blog about this bill here. This bill will work in concert with recently-announced initiatives from the Biden Administration.

• Support the Caribbean Strategic Engagement Act (H.R. 4015) in the House of Representatives.

The Haiti Criminal Collusion Transparency Act would require reporting on and sanctioning Haitian gang members in the U.S. and their supporters given how their activity facilitates more violence in Haiti itself. The National Haitian American Elected Official Network is prioritizing this bill, so we are following the lead of impacted people. This bill has recently moved from committee back to the whole Senate.

• Support the Caribbean Strategic Transparency Act (S. 396) in the Senate.

"Like Claudine, let us work so that all children have the same rights."

This is the hope written above the stage and on the back of the bright yellow Camp Claudine 2023 tee shirts. That is no small hope given the continually deteriorating conditions in Haiti. (See: NY Times and Miami Herald articles attached to Bridges.)

Fr. Dachemy Destime (right) opened camp with a blessing of campers and counselors.



Mis Astride, shared with campers how to care for their bodies and emotional health. There was frank discussion of sexual development and appropriate behavior. Written questions were handed to the counselors for anonymity.

Below, campers show off the "Kits for Girls" that girls, 10 years and older, each happily received so that they would not need to lose time from school or camp just because they had their



period. These environmentally friendly, reusable sanitary pads and holder were provided by the Ladies of St. Ann in Maine (thanks Mercy Sister Dale Jarvis) and our Irish friends in Solèy Haiti.

Children shared responsibilities like cleanup after their hot meal. On the left, they are washing dishes.

Before camp started, the counselors had prepared materials and cut strips of Banana bark for the campers to make biodegradable bags to plant cherry tree seeds in.

presented a session
in which the children
filled their "tach
bannann" banana
bark containers with
good dirt mixed with
sugar cane residue,

put in two cherry seeds and covered them with a fine layer of dirt. The children were assisted by Met Lucker (on right holding a bucket with seeds three children brought

from their homes) and Agronomist Teligene. Later when





new cherry trees are three weeks old, the whole container can be planted in the ground.

Camp Claudine children gave the environment a boost with useful brooms the children fashioned from recycled coke bottles, tree planters from banana bark, and reusable feminine sanitary supplies. And they had tons of fun!
