

Why did you go to Haiti? It's a simple question that is at the heart of why the RJM *remain* in Haiti in 2024 despite the risks and dangers of gang violence, political chaos, and economic collapse.

Recently, Global Sisters Report, a project of National Catholic Reporter, met with Sisters Pat Dillon and Jackie Picard over Zoom to listen to them share about why the RJM remain committed to being with the people of Haiti and to sustaining the ministries that the RJM have established with Haitians in Gros Morne, Jean-Rabel, and Port-au-Prince.

St. Claudine Thévenet took risks in a dangerous time when she gathered women together to do what they could to educate and nurture poor girls in their French homeland. Those first companions of St. Claudine ministered as best they could as the world around them was rocked by violence and political turbulence that had taken Claudine's own brothers' lives.

That impulse to share God's merciful love with those who most need to experience it, despite risks, is what sent the RJM to India in 1842 and what brought them to the United States in 1877.

After the Church declared Claudine a saint in 1993, the Religious of Jesus and Mary in the United States accepted a challenge to look closely at their founder and her early companions to better understand their shared mission. As they reflected and prayed, the sisters saw Haiti, a nation so close to our own yet so far away in terms of the experiences of dignity and care that were available to the people there, and Haiti reminded them of the conditions which moved St. Claudine and the first Religious of Jesus and Mary to take action.





in Fon Ibo, 587 students at **Lekòl Jezi-Mari**, the RJM parochial school, depend on our continued solidarity and care. Children from age three through 9th grade are not only being educated but fed thanks to the work being done by Sr. Pat Dillon and the faculty and staff.

At **Maison Bon Samaritain** in Gros Morne, Sr. Jackie Picard has built up a community who give shelter and support to elders and persons with disabilities who would otherwise be homeless.

The JM Mobile Medical Clinic in Jean-Rabel and the San Jose Prosthetics Clinic in Port-au-Prince provide professional medical care for people who have few options to maintain the health and wellbeing that they need to support their families.

RJM, like Sr. Valle from Spain, Sr. Rose from Ireland, and Sr. Liz from Peru, live and work with the people of Haiti to empower local lay companions in mission to conduct the RJM ministries and to help coordinate international volunteers like doctors and nurses who recently were able to support our Haitian partners in taking care of the sick in Jean-Rabel.

But, none of the work done by the sisters, by our Haitian partners, or by volunteers would be possible without the prayer and support of so many friends and family of the RJM, *like you!*
