## THE GREAT LOCAL MANGO SAVE - Gros Morne, Haiti

The Quixote Center recently published a report written by Sr. Pat Dillon about "The Great Local Mango Save". The full article is attached to Bridges, and below is an excerpt.

In April 2024 we began a last-minute effort to salvage some of the delicious, nutritious mangoes which are the main cash crop of Gros Morne. It is from the mangoes which ripen from April to August that small-scale growers earn the money to buy food for their families, send their children to school and pay for health care. However, this was the second year in a row that the growers could not sell to the exporters, who are their main buyers, due to the extreme insecurity in Haiti and cancellation of their export contract with the USDA.

The Notre Dame de la Chandeleur parish Caritas asked the Quixote Center, which was working on having the export contract renewed, to find funds to buy the local mangoes and donate them for school children. The amazing response to Quixote fund raising made it possible to buy and distribute just under 20,000 dozen (230,000 mangoes).



In Gonaives the Viatorians received many of the mangoes at their school and coordinated with other schools for distribution. Direct deliveries went to one hard-to-reach school and Mother Theresa of Calcutta's Sisters' clinic and home for the elderly and four other schools. It would be hard to say who received the mangoes with greater joy and appreciation! In Gros Morne mangoes were delivered direct to the eight schools. After the school year ended, the schools/parishes happily continued to distribute the mangoes.

The growers received \$25,340 for 19,965 dozen mangoes, the truck drivers received \$13,385, and the coordinator, dispatchers (who traveled to Gonaives), \$1,885 and accountant \$300. The donations to the Quixote Center covered the payments to the mango growers and facility workers /truck drivers. The Religious of Jesus and Mary covered the other \$2,185.

Transport owners/truck drivers have almost been put out of business by bandits controlling the highways. Tolls must be paid which raise the price owners/drivers have to ask customers. These drivers were grateful for the income and delighted to transport the mangoes.

The growers were able to pay school fees so their children could take their exams and get their report cards. Some who had started to cut down their mango trees to sell the wood decided to save their trees.

Only God knows how many mango trees were not cut down because the growers found some hope and income from the generosity of those donors who answered the appeal of the Quixote Center. Thank you!

## MIGRANT MINISTRY EVENTS - San Diego, CA

At 6:00 AM on Saturday, I participated in our Congregation's Formation Webinar led by Sr. Lourdes Várquez, RJM from Canada. It was titled "Forms of Modern Day Slavery".



Such slavery takes place in all countries in various ways - forced labor; trafficking; forced marriages; domestic servitude and abuse; and the list goes on. The most vulnerable are the homeless, migrants and especially women and children. Migrants forced from their home countries due to these experiences as well as effects of climate change disasters unfortunately are vulnerable to these same situations while seeking hope migrating to new countries. Such painful 'push factors' we have listened to both at the border wall as well as at the shelter. There are two 30ft border walls here. This one is on the Tijuana/USA border and the sign on the tent says, "seeking asylum is a human right". Below is the second 30ft wall where once in the USA, the migrants await Border Patrol to turn themselves in for asylum.

Then on Sunday morning, several of us from our Sisters' Collaborative participated in auxiliary Bishop Ramon Bejarano's presentation at USD, our Diocese Catholic University, "Trapped Between Borders: A Migrant Nightmare". He presented a simple historical background of migration, its causes, its biblical background and our current day migration experiences. Some of the actions promoted by the Bishops are: welcoming the stranger, respecting their human dignity, accompanying and helping them, advocating for improved just immigration reform policies, and protecting borders in the process.

Below at dawn, a 4-year-old boy warmly dressed holds his mother's hand after they received food, water, a backpack from us and American Friends, a Quaker group. Next, the same boy with his parents after the Border Patrol had them strip down to one item of clothing, which is the usual procedure but not always for children. Then, Sr. Rosa Mejia, RJM praying with a small group and we are giving backpacks for people to put their removed clothing











I continue to ask us to be united in prayer for migrants especially women and children, to be aware of modern-day slavery in our midst, to accompany one another in being transformed by our encounters with the most vulnerable. I feel Claudine is in our midst...

### VULNERABILITY - Jean Rabel, Haiti

Please note that these are NOT photos of Micheline and her children, yet represent them.

Micheline comes to the Centre for help. Her story is as follows:



She is 34 years old. She was put out of the house she rented, on 17th October. Her husband left two years ago, trying to get work abroad. He died en route. She was pregnant with her 5th child.

Previously she had her first child, a little girl, with another man. He left her and went to Port-au-Prince, where he entered into another relationship. When the child was aged 4, he took her to

Port-au-Prince. The stepmother treated

her so badly that she returned to her own mother, Micheline, in Jean Rabel. Four years ago, when the girl was then 10 years of age, her father sent another person to bring her to the capital. Her mother did not want to let her go, but was helpless. What lies in store for her daughter.....hunger, violence, prostitution, abuse?

Micheline is ready to cry, but cannot dwell on this scene. Her second daughter is a restavek with another family nearby.

Her other 3 children, two in school and the youngest, a 2 yr old boy, are in her care. She tries to provide for them, by washing clothes for other people, and sometimes selling some sweets and crackers in the marketplace.



How vulnerable can one be..... as a mother.....a daughter.....a woman....a child? God have mercy!


and even a book sign-out system and library cards for the children. R.I.P.
